Big Questions

Make me to know your ways, O Lord; teach me your paths. – Psalm 25:4

Last month I was asked to give an assembly to ninety Year 1 children, aged 5-6, at a local primary school. I was prepared for joyful chaos and had brought along all kinds of objects and pictures with me to share how Christians show our love for God and our world.

Before I was able to finished my introduction, hands were shooting up into the air, eyes bright and minds bubbling up with big theological questions ranging from 'Where does Jesus live now?' and 'How do we

know God is real if we can't see God?' to 'Why is there still war in the world?' and a lot of questions requesting the gory details of exactly how Jesus died on the cross. As you can imagine, the teachers looked on with wry smiles as I did my best to explore these

mysteries of life and God in an ageappropriate way, mindful of the different beliefs held by some of the children and their families.

Towards the end, one little boy cautiously shared that his grandma had died recently and that he hoped she was in heaven with God now. This immediately sparked even

more hands popping up into the air to tell me about people in their families or community who had died. I came away from our spirit-filled time of wondering with a deep sense of privilege. By letting go and enabling the children's

curiosity and questions to shape our time together, we covered far more inspiring topics than if I had just kept to my plan and reached a place where they felt comfortable sharing their own stories and hurts not just with me but with each other.

Plastic Free July CHURCH

Plastic Free July is about reducing single-use plastic waste every day at home, work, Church, even in your local cafe.

Take a reusable cup to the cafe, a simple solution to disposable coffee cups. Popular choices include travel cups made of glass, ceramic and insulated stainless steel with sealable lid, you probably already have one at home.

Or stuck for a gift for someone who has a birthday coming up buy them one.

Buying plastic-wrapped or packaged fruits and vegetables can be convenient, but unfortunately it creates plastic waste. Instead, consider looking out for loose fruit and vegetables in your local grocery store, or head to a farmers' market or organic store where plastic packaging is less often used.

Choosing lightweight, reusable produce bags instead of the single-use plastic bags that are usually provided. Be sure to look for ones made from recycled plastic or repurposed netting fabric. Many stores offer cardboard boxes as alternatives as well.

It's also worth asking if you really need a bag at all. For example, if you're buying a bunch of bananas, consider keeping them loose in your

shopping basket or trolley and transport them home in your reusable shopping bag.

There are lots of ways to help reduce plastic. The above are just two examples.




